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Regent House School







Since Regent House School was founded in the imposing Regency mansion in 1924, it has grown not only in size but also in terms of success.

After significant investment in the Regent House campus, our extensive resources include specialist rooms for all practical subjects, including five IT rooms. Our music and drama facilities offer rehearsal space, a recording studio and a performance theatre.

With our focus on high levels of achievement, we have introduced a rigorous assessment and reporting cycle that analyses pupil performance every 8-10 weeks. Our Heads of Department continually review what is being taught in order to improve pupil performance. Where pupils require additional support, our extensive mentoring programme guides those pupils towards their goals in partnership with their teachers and parents.

We have a long and successful sporting tradition and strongly emphasise the value and benefits of participating in school sport. We are extremely proud of our sporting culture and are fortunate to have many talented young sports men and women who participate on a week to week basis for the school.

Our sports facilities are excellent inside and out. They include a gymnasium, sports hall, two fitness suites, three rugby pitches and a synthetic hockey pitch.

At Regent House we have a very strong pastoral ethos. Staff strive to build positive relationships with students in a supportive environment that results in a genuine sense of belonging.

At the same time we set high standards of behaviour that students understand and can respect, both in class and around the school. Our approach focuses on knowing each and every pupil and understanding their personal needs, aptitudes and aspirations.

We offer an exciting co-curricular programme that enriches pupils lives and enables them to feel involved and valued. Staff devote their time and energy to create opportunities that make the school experience memorable as well as academically successful.

To all this we add a range of local and global opportunities that will provide them with greater awareness and understanding.

Recent opportunities include ski trips and sports tours as well as educational trips to London, Paris, New York, Berlin and a Borneo jungle expedition with Camps International.





School Life

School begins each morning at 8.50am with Form Class and each year group attends a morning Assembly once a week. A typical Junior School day is shown to the right.

Morning Assembly and the specifications for Religious Education are entirely non-denominational. Parents who prefer that their children do not attend morning Assembly or Religious Education have the statutory right of withdrawal. Arrangements can be made with the Headmaster.

There are 9 teaching periods of 35 minutes each day, a mid-morning break of 15 minutes and a break of 40 minutes for lunch. School finishes at 3.20pm.

Senior School break is held at 10:50am and Senior lunch at 12:55pm to ensure all pupils enjoy a pleasant break and lunch time experience.

Organisation of Classes

Years 8 - 10

Pupils are allocated to seven or eight classes which ensure a reasonable mix of pupils from different primary schools.

Years 11 - 14

Each pupil's programme of classes is governed by the options chosen. Pupils are offered a broad, balanced and relevant curriculum which will empower them to recognise and achieve their potential and to make informed and responsible decisions throughout their lives.

Most pupils in Key Stage 4 study nine or ten GCSE subjects but programmes are adapted to meet the needs of each individual pupil. Additionally, all pupils will study LLW, PE, Games and will be given the opportunity to study a short course in Religious Studies.

In Key Stage 5 most pupils study four AS level subjects in Year 13 and three or four A level subjects in Year 14. Pupils also access an extensive choice of Physical Education options, comprehensive Careers Education and a wide and varied General Studies programme.

House System

For the purpose of competition in games and other whole school activities the school is divided into four houses; Castlereagh, Clandeboye, Scrabo and Strangford. Pupils are allocated to a house when they join us.

Academic Achievement

Regent House is a school with high expectations for all, where the school community is challenged to aspire to excellence in an inclusive, supportive and respectful environment.

To promote high achievement, we have introduced a rigorous assessment and reporting cycle that analyses pupil performance approximately every 8-10 weeks. Our Heads of Department have carefully designed these informative assessments and continually review what is being taught, to better inform everyone on pupil performance.

Where pupils require additional support, our extensive mentoring programme guides those pupils towards their goals in partnership with their teachers and parents.



- At A level 33 students gained at least 3 A grades; 7 students attained at least 3 A* grades; and 2 students attained at least 4 A* grades
- At GCSE 46 pupils gained at least 9 A grades with 4 pupils gaining at least 10 A* grades.
- 80% of all GCSE grades awarded last year to Regent House pupils were at grades A* B.
- 66 pupils achieved passes in at least 8 subjects at A* or A.

A Positive Community

A caring and stimulating environment encouraging respect for all.

Our established links with all primary schools in the catchment area ensures that our pastoral care programme begins while pupils are still in primary school. Pastoral staff liaise closely with the feeder schools to facilitate a smooth transition to grammar school.

All our teachers have a pastoral care role but in addition, there is a professionally trained team of dedicated teachers. This team coordinates a pastoral programme both informally and through the formal series of Learning for Life and Work classes which are timetabled for each pupil throughout the school.

Through this programme teachers strive to create a supportive environment in which all pupils can develop the social and personal skills necessary to play a confident and responsible role in society. Therefore, although Regent House is large there is a caring attitude among staff and pupils, and as a result the school has a pleasant and happy atmosphere.

Heads of Junior, Middle and Senior School oversee the pastoral provision at each key stage whilst each Year group has two Year Teachers who look after the welfare and progress of pupils within their allocation. There are also Form Tutors who look after individual classes.

A Special Educational Needs coordinator ensures that individual education plans are put in place where appropriate, through consultation with feeder schools, parents, teachers and the relevant agencies. In this way, it is our aim that the needs of each individual pupil receive attention.

To the same end, parents are warmly encouraged to meet with the Year Staff, Heads of School, or the Vice-Principal (Pastoral), to discuss their children's progress. Parents' meetings are also held on an annual basis for each year group.

As a large school we employ a Matron, who is a fully qualified nurse and can deal with all physical ailments and we also have the services of part-time pupil counsellors.

If you have any concerns about your child's safety, the school has a Designated Teacher, Mrs Haugh, who has specific responsibility for Child Protection. If Mrs Haugh is unavailable, pupils, staff or parents should contact Mr Matchett, Mr Thompson or Miss Ritchie.

Careers Education

At Regent House we recognise the importance of high quality Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance.

All of our students are fully informed of the range of career opportunities and pathways available to them. They are encouraged and supported to maximise the options open to them, and most importantly, they are empowered to make career decisions which enable them to manage their own career development successfully and confidently. In today's complex, competitive and rapidly changing world we provide a high quality CEIAG programme which meets the individual needs and requirements of all of our pupils.


Employability classes are provided for all Year 8 – 12 pupils and a variety of careers workshops and talks are given to sixth form pupils as part of the General Studies Programme. Pupils have access to individualised personal career planning and advice, psychometric tests and an excellent careers library. Using Unifrog, an online Careers Education platform, pupils from Year 10 onwards can research, collate and store information about career pathways which interest them and begin to build an employment profile which they will develop through KS4 and KS5. From Year 12, pupils also have the

opportunity to gain work experience, participate in practice interviews, and attend a variety of talks and visits, to fully equip and inform them of all pathways available to them.

We value the major role that parents play in helping pupils decide on future study and career choices and the Head of Careers is available to meet parents as required. Subject Choice Information Evenings are provided on an annual basis for parents of Year 10 and Year 12 pupils and virtual UCAS Information Evenings are held annually for parents of pupils in Year 14. Additional support is available through the Careers Service, who interview all Year 12 pupils. This independent service is also available to Year 13 and 14 pupils.

Close links are maintained with local employers, FE colleges and universities who not only assist with work experience and taster courses but also attend our Careers events within school. Students also have the opportunity to attend the UCAS Discovery Day in Year 13.

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Music

There are many opportunities to develop musical skills at Regent House. The Music Department has numerous groups and ensembles which include Junior Choir, Junior Chamber Choir, Junior Concert Band, Junior String Orchestra, Senior Choir, Senior Chamber Choir, Senior Concert Band, Senior String Orchestra and Big Band. There are also a number of smaller ensembles such as Brass Ensemble, Woodwind Ensemble, Senior String Octet and Saxophone Quartet.

Over 150 pupils take music lessons in Regent House each week. Lessons are available on

piano, guitar, percussion, drum kit, flute, clarinet, saxophone, brass instruments and stringed instruments. The Spring Concert held in March is one of the highlights of the musical calendar.

The choirs and bands also perform at external events for local charities and participate in music competitions. In 2017 the Chamber Choir won the BBC Radio Ulster School Choir of the Year competition and were Runners Up at the prestigious Open Choral Section at the Bangor International Choral Festival in 2023.

Drama

Each year the Drama Department performs two plays which showcase the amazing talent within our pupil body.

Recent productions include the musicals 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat' for senior pupils and 'Matilda' for junior pupils.

Participating in a school production is an excellent experience for everyone, from Year 8 to Year 14. Up to one hundred people are involved on stage, in the band and in the technical and support crews.

The joy of creating something magical is a lifechanging experience, and gives the performers a new-found confidence in themselves.

There is no better feeling than receiving the applause of the audience after two hours of exhilarating theatre. Great camaraderie is fostered, and new friendships made.

Recently pupils have participated in ski trips and sports tours to Italy as well as educational trips to London, Paris, New York, Berlin and jungle expeditions to Borneo and Peru.
